


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Timor-Leste





Timor-Leste

- Post-conflict, developing country
- 1.2 million people (2015)
- Many challenges
 - Rapid population growth
 - Undernutrition (intergenerational consequences)
 - High poverty
 - Unemployment
 - Education
- Fisheries:

Very small-scale

Limited data → small pelagic fish important



Timor-Leste's **sardine** fisheries as a case study...

Methods

Focus group discussions and semi-structured interviews

Household surveys

Observations and informal conversations







18 months fieldwork

2 x main field sites (urban & rural)

Sardines sold to waiting traders at the beach...






Sold at road-side stalls or markets... or taken house-to-house.

Sometimes




Remove sardines from nets (large catches)





Buy and sell sardines















A closer look at fish trading...

(In Atabae)

- 157 households surveyed (~25% of households in 2 neighbouring rural communities)
- 24 surveyed households engaged in fish trading (15.3%)






Challenges for women?

Preliminary ideas

- Large quantities regular buyer arrangements (Atabae)
- Competitive negotiating environment (Dili)



- Markets (local road-side vs. inland or urban centers)
- Transport

 (walking vs.
 motorbike or
 car)

Opportunities for women

- Women involved where access to fish + opportunity for road side sales
- Sardines = cash
 - Bought at 20 for \$1
 - Sold at 10 for \$1
- → Important as limited opportunities for earning income
- Existing alternative products (value-added???)
 - Ikan saboko (traditionally grilled fish)
 - Road-side rice & fish restaurants
 - Bottled sardines in oil (NGO-supported)
- Enthusiastic & educated youth
 - But perspective on fisheries as a future?
