Impacts of COVID-19

What are the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic to gender aspects in the small-scale fisheries supply chain?

- The major roles of women are fish processing and fish trade. During the pandemic, women became jobless and lost their income because of lack of raw materials for processing.
- Online trade, which is facilitated by the younger family members, has become the significant adaptation of the family business to cope with the pandemic.
- Each family member has specific roles and responsibilities. During the pandemic, relationship among family members has become more intact and resulted in higher income than before the pandemic.

Policy Implications

- Need to ensure equal participation of both genders in all fishery related activities
- Women empowerment in generating income and refocuses conservation should be considered
- Fishery policy makers need to better recognize the diverse roles and perspectives of men and women

- Documenting women roles by sex disaggregated data and gender analysis
- Planning development program based on gender roles, need, and expertise

- Monitoring and evaluation of projects with gender sensitive indicators
